House tackles eminent domain, taxes, veterans benefits and public notices

HF 2664 A bill approved by the Iowa House would allow landowners who are subject to eminent domain requests by hazardous pipeline companies to challenge the legitimacy of those requests in court earlier in the permit proceedings.

The bill was approved by a bipartisan, 86-7 vote.

It is meant to expedite a court decision about whether eminent domain is allowable — a decision that under current rules might come many months or years after state regulators issue a permit. The bill would allow court challenges before permits are issued, at the request of affected landowners or the companies that propose the projects. The bill would not, itself, limit eminent domain for the pipeline projects.

"This legislation simply allows both landowners and companies the opportunity to have a declaratory judgment up front on the constitutionality of an eminent domain request, before precious time and money are wasted," said Rep. Steven Holt, R-Denison. We await Senate action.

Harder to raise taxes

HJR 2006, the decision to raise taxes, should not be made lightly. It should be difficult to take additional money away from Iowans.

This past week, we passed a joint resolution to send a Constitutional Amendment to the ballot for Iowans to vote on. This Constitutional Amendment would require a two-thirds majority vote in the legislature to increase the income tax or to create a new tax. Because this bill deals with a Constitutional Amendment, the legislative ly. body would need to pass it again in the next general assembly (2025 or 2026). Then, it would become a ballot measure for all Iowans to weigh in

Biomarker Insurance

The House passed HF 2668 to help improve the quality of health care and make Iowans healthier. HF 2668 requires health insurers to provide coverage for biomarker testing when the testing has proven to result in better results

Biomarker testing checks for certain genes, proteins or other molecules to look for signs or behaviors of specific diseases or conditions. Doctors can use these biomarker test results to better tailor their treatment. It is often used for patients with cancer or rheumatoid arthritis.

With this being covered by insurance, patients will benefit from more effective care that will better treat their condition and by avoiding ineffective, harmful treatments as well as earlier diagnosis. Additionally, it will benefit the health care system by lowering the overall cost of care.

This past week, Iowa House Republicans backed the blue with the passage of HF 2661.

This bill did three major things to support our men and women in law enforcement:

- The bill makes changes to IPERS for Sheriffs and Deputies. It allows them to retire at up to 80% of their salaries and includes a 1.5% cost of living adjustment.
- It ensures that a person charged with murder of a peace officer or corrections officer, or felonious assault of an officer is not eligible for
- It creates a tax credit of up to \$2,000 for public safety officers moving to the state of

The family will be making a donation in memory of Jerilyn to places special to her, such as the Renwick Public Library and Arbor Springs.


