GRAND JUNCTION CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING MINUTES APRIL 8, 2024

Mayor Gerold Herrick opened the regular Council Meeting of The City of Grand Junction at 6 pm on Monday, April 8, 2024, at City Hall. Council present were Paula Hoskinson, Lora Lyons, Dennis Jacobs, Spencer Kirk and Tom Launderville.

Motion by Jacobs, seconded by Lyons to approve agenda. All ayes.

Motion by Hoskinson, seconded by Lyons to approve consent agenda. All ayes.

Motion by Hoskinson, seconded by Lyons to open public hearing on Proposed Property Tax Levy. All ayes. No public comments. Motion by Hoskinson, seconded by Lyons to close public meeting. All ayes.

Motion by Hoskinson, seconded by Lyons to purchase the new marquee sign using the funds received from Grow Greene County Foundation. All ayes.

Motion by Lyons, seconded by Kirk to donate \$300 to the Meals on Wheels organization. All ayes.

Discussion was held concerning the hiring of seasonal mowing help. The person that did it last year has first chance. He was called and does not want the job. Motion by Hoskinson, seconded by Lyons to hire seasonal mowing person until we get a new city person hired. This person will be on call on an as needed basis. Jacobs aye. Kirk and Launderville nay.

Motion by Hoskinson, seconded by Launderville to amend the contract and have Moranville Tree Service come in a cut down and remove the first 7 trees that were voted on before. All ayes.

Motion by Hoskinson, seconded by Launderville to take the scoreboard at the softball field down and store in the shed at the lagoon. All ayes.

Motion by Launderville, seconded by Lyons to approve Resolution Approving Post-Issuance Compliance Policy. All ayes.

Jim Letting from Bolton & Menk was in attendance at the meeting to discuss the Infiltration and Inflow Study that the engineers are working on. This will be the next steps in the lagoon project.

Motion by Lyons, seconded by Kirk to approve and sign the Maintenance and Repair Loan while the SRF loan is still available. All ayes.

Department reports: Mayor informed everyone that he had street lights donated to the city that will fit the older fixtures. LEDs and eyes will still need to be purchased.

Kirk threw the idea around about removing the tree stumps around town. Kirk also mentioned getting rid of using cold patch and using cement to replace the pot holes around town. Hoskinson wanted to thank everyone for the donations to the pool. Items on the pool wish list were all donated within 24 hours. Library gave their report and stated they received \$4700 for LED lighting at the library. The Fire Department gave their report and stated that they have received several grants. 2023 WATER QUALITY REPORT FOR JEFFERSON WATER DEPARTMENT

This report contains important information regarding the water quality in our water system. The source of our water is groundwater. Our water quality testing shows the following results:

DEFINITIONS

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) - The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) - The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health.

ppb - parts per billion, ppm - parts per million, pCi/L - picocuries per liter, N/A - Not applicable, ND - Not detected, RAA - Running Annual Average, Treatment Technique (TT) - A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Action Level (AL) - The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG) - The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL) - The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

SGT - Single Sample Result, RTCR - Revised Total Coliform Rule, NTU - Nephelometric Turbidity Units

GENERAL INFORMATION

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants.

The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water posed a health risk. More information about contaminants or potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. ADDITIONAL HEALTH INFORMATION

While your drinking water meets EPA's standard for arsenic, it does contain low levels of arsenic. EPA's standard balances the current understanding of arsenic's possible health effects against the costs of removing arsenic from drinking water.

EPA continues to research the health effects of low levels of arsenic, which is a mineral known to cause cancer in humans at high concentrations and is linked to other health effects such as skin damage and circulatory problems.

SOURCE WATER ASSESSMENT INFORMATION

This water supply obtains its water from the buried sand and gravel of the Buried Sand and Gravel aquifer. The Buried Sand and Gravel aquifer was determined to have low susceptibility to contamination because the characteristics of the aquifer and over lying materials provide natural protection from contaminants at the land surface. The Buried Sand and Gravel wells will have low susceptibility to surface contaminants such as leaking underground storage tanks, contaminant spills, and excess fertilizer application.
